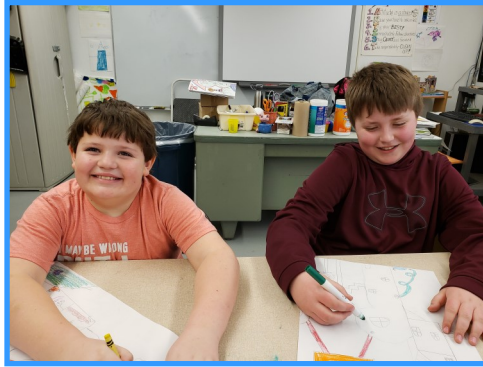

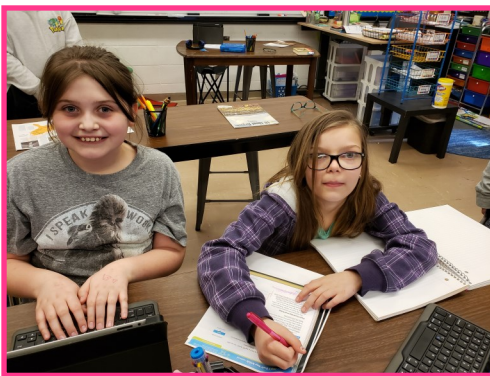


Art

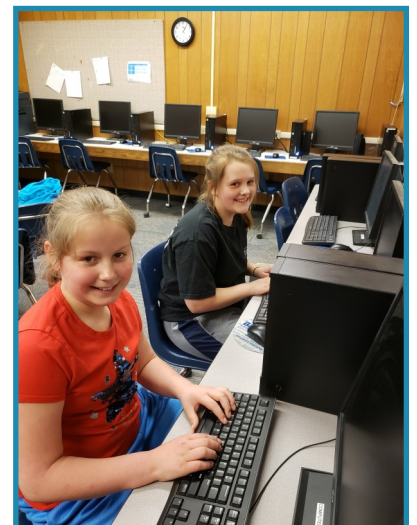
Writing is lots of fun, because you can write your own story. If you like mystery you can write a story about that if you want.

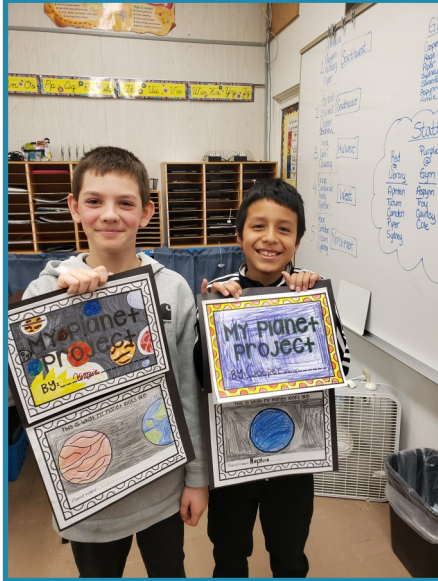

When I started at North Star Schools this fall teaching in the Title 1 position, I had quite a few community members ask what Title 1 is, etc.?

According to the U.S. Department of Education, the **purpose of Title 1** funding, "is to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high quality education and reach, at minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments."

The school uses a few different tests, including Star reading and math tests to identify potential students that could benefit from a little extra assistance in Reading and Math primarily. I then talk to the classroom teacher and inquire if they are seeing the same things in their classroom. If they are then we try to schedule that student in for some extra assistance in the Title 1 venue. Ideally, the student receives some assistance and is eventually able to go back into the classroom for that area. Also a group of teachers will be offering these options during the summer months. So if you think your child might benefit from some extra assistance this summer don't hesitate to talk to me about setting a time up for that.

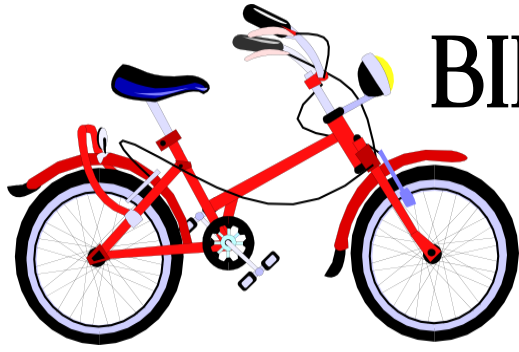

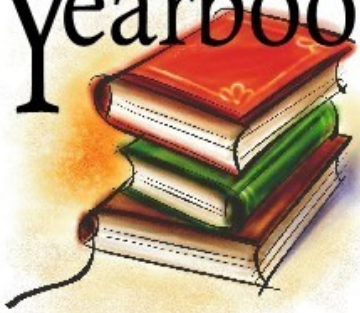


April 1-30, 2019

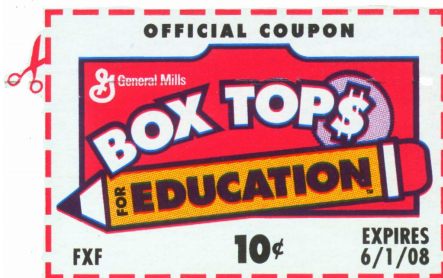


Shoes, Shoes, Shoes...
