

Hello All,

What a winter! The difference from this year to last year is quite dramatic so far. I guess we'll see if that continues through the remaining months, or if old man winter has a some more tricks in store for us this year.

This month, I'd like to talk about the standards-based grading that we use at the elementary. While we have shared information directly with parents, I know there are still some questions. Here's a bit more info.

- *Standards-based grading is a modern method of grade reporting that focuses on what the kids <u>know</u>. We are sharing the specifics of what a student knows and can do with a parent and future teachers. This allows parents and teachers to better understand what a students strengths and weaknesses are, and work with them more effectively.*
- *Your student is assigned a score of 1-4 for anything they have been working on.* Students are assessed to find out whether they have mastered the standards in question. The teacher assigns a score of 1-4 based on their knowledge of the standard. Here's what those scores mean:
 - <u>1</u> The student is just beginning to learn about it, and has very little knowledge or skill.
 - <u>2</u> The student has developed some knowledge, but haven't yet mastered the skill.
 - $\underline{3}$ The student has mastered the skill in a way appropriate for their grade level.
 - <u>4</u> The student has mastered the skill, and has skills beyond their grade level.
- *The difference between a 3 and 4 is not the same as the difference between an A and a B or a C.* In this system, teachers want to make sure that all students get to a 3 on all standards. As long as a student masters a skill (level 3) there is no reason to be concerned about their performance.
- *Standards-based grading removes behavior from the <u>academic grade.</u> Your student's score on any standard should show what they know, not whether they completed all assignments on time or have good work habits. We report their work habits and behavior separately, so you can still get an idea of what they are doing while learning.*

In closing, standards-based grading is a well-researched grading method focused on reporting what students know and informing parents and teachers for future instruction. If you have more questions, I am happy to help you with it, and your child's teacher would be happy to explain any specific grading questions. I also have a lot of articles and resources that can explain it better than I can, and would be happy to share those with anyone interested. I hope you all have a wonderful February.



Sixth graders used the lab for the first time and had an amazing experience. Thanks to Mrs. Renaker, we were able to use the technology and materials to conduct an experiment.




Our Science Experiment

We learned about how the color of an object, placed under a lamp, absorbs heat.

Outcomes

We learned black absorbs the most heat while yellow absorbs the least. We graphed our information and shared our results.

We learned that the Earth absorbs energy at different rates through exposure to the suns rays. We are currently studying weather and will be doing many more experiments about weather.







Getting Dur Hands Dirty

The Earth Science Students get their hands dirty in January working with soils. Hey, we're Earth Science. We are supposed to get our hands dirty, aren't we? Anyway, we were studying how to classify soils using a soil texture triangle. In this activity, students are to take a sample of soil in their hands and wet it slightly. If they can make their sample into a ball that holds together, they can determine that it contains clay. Being able to make a ribbon of a certain length will give us an



idea of how much clay is there. The longer the ribbon, the greater the percentage of clay. In the second part of the activity, students had to add a bit more water and rub some of their sample between their fingers to feel for sand and silt. If it

felt more gritty, we knew that it contained more sand, while a silky feel would help us determine that it held more silt.

As a result of the activity, we were successfully able to classify the two soil samples we had. The first sample was from the base of Black

Butte near Havre. We determined the soil classification to be Sandy Clay, which definitely makes sense as the Butte is made mainly of igneous rock with a lot of quartz in it. The second sample was from the Beaver Creek flood



plain not far from the Butte. Our tests showed this soil to be a Silty Clay Loam.

The students found that knowing what your soil type is can be very important. Each particle in the soil can help with different characteristics. Clay brings important water and nutrient holding capacity to the soil. You do want some permeability as well, which is why it's good to have sand in your soil as well as clay.





All in all, it was a great activity to do and the students really enjoyed themselves. Winner, winner, chicken dinner! Until next time. —Pam Renaker




Garrett Pedersen, and Kenidee Wolery. Rehearsals began

Forms for the upcoming Trustee Election to be held on Tuesday May 7, 2019 are available. Forms may be picked up from Kathy Preeshl (election administrator) at the High School Business Office located at North Star High School, 105, 3rd Ave NE, Rudyard, MT 59540

NO CANDIDATE MAY APPEAR ON THE BALLOT UNLESS HE OR SHE MEETS THIS DEADLINE. (13-10-201, 20-3-305 MCA). (No earlier than 145 days or not later than 40 days before election). Candidate must be registered to vote at the time the Oath is filed.

Any candidate that has already filed for election, but wishes to withdraw their name, may do so by sending a statement of withdrawal to the election administrator, no later than 5:00 PM the day before ballot certification. (20-3-305(2)(b)MCA), (Thursday April 4, 2019 by 5:00 PM)

Candidate forms must be picked up and returned by 4:00 PM on Thursday March 28, 2019.


can order your transcript:
